## From the Sump by Felix Furtak

For this issue I promised to write about the "coupé horizontale", but as usual, events overtake us. These have been unearthed under the depths of a dashboard that left my jaws wide open, and I need to share it. It might be a bit technical but worth following as there is a lesson to be learned: Look at this picture:



The brake pedal acts on the half-moon (16) which drives the brake booster, which then drives the master cylinder. If you want the change the brake booster, remove bracket (17) pull out brake booster. Very easy. We got this car years later, and had to redo the master cylinder again at is was a total mess. On reassembly the pedal was hard and all looked fine. Now we work on the aircon and had to go under the dash only to find that lever (16) has

actually fallen off the pin of the pedal and was only wedged in on the edge of the half-moon, as for some obstruction, it could not fall down all the way. Bracket (17) was missing. If you look at the whole construction, you will see that bracket (17) is needed to keep the assembly together during the removal of the master cylinder, hence this bracket is absolutely essential. Glad I found that before somebody died...

But that is by far not all..... the same car also had the power steering rack replaced, and refitted with the old pipes that looked like that:



It started leaking once looked upon too hard. But in all fairness to those loyal to the mother city, all of the above happened in Gauteng.

Just to finish off the issue, some of my favourite bits from the archive:

This is a steering doughnut, a part very common in most older cars. This example came from a licensed road going vehicle:

This one is unbelievable: This timing belt came off a running engine. The owner drove the vehicle hard and waited with the belt-change to the very last second, literally, see how razor sharp the teeth are. You see it best on the shadow:





And the belt was also rather overused: Coming from a local car celebrity, known for highly extended service schedules.
